REFLECTIONS ON BUILDING COMMUNITIES IN MY LIFE

Last week, after putting together a fairly successful birthday party for one of our 98-year-old former tennis players ([see the collage](#)), I had an *aha moment* that much of my life was about building communities and how that benefitted all of us.

In high school and college, aside from playing on intramural sports teams, I was always too preoccupied with my studies to get involved in other group activities.

When I started teaching, I became involved in the teachers union because some bean counter at the District Office was trying (even then) to have us test the kids to death and rob and take the joy out of learning and teaching. So, after my tenure, I wrote for and became president of that organization, and helped make it strong enough to secure the first collective bargaining contract (1976), to gain compensation for having an MA (\$1,200/yr), and to secure a dental plan which others and I still use today as retired educators.

As a middle school teacher of Journalism I helped the school newspaper win county awards, and communicate with students, teachers, parents, School Board, and retired teachers. The kids learned how to write and use the power of the written word as they changed the school climate and even some outdated rules.

As a retiree, I contacted most of my high school and college classmates, most of whom I

hadn't seen in 40 years, and set up a semi-private webpage where they shared their life stories, and put us in touch with each other again. ([pic](#))

In a spiritual community to which we belonged, I found great joy in organizing several yearly retreats for the men.

Even now, I have this select little group of family and friends to whom I send this monthly newsletter and/or other pieces judged worthy of your readership.

All of these community building activities did (& do) the following:

- 1) allowed us to set and reach goals we could not have done alone.
- 2) provided a setting to form or reestablish friendships;
- 3) helped me and others attain personal growth and skills.

I invited a new friend Marc to check out our tennis group at the party I had organized (above). After introducing him to the group I went about the task of taking pictures and cutting the cake, etc. Marc later emailed me that he had sat across from a guy named Chuck, and he and Chuck started introducing each other. Chuck notice that Marc had a French accent, and told him that his son had been dating a French girl
